Problem 1

Part a. Prove the Central Limit Theorem (for finite variance), which states that *any* random variable X with a mean μ and finite variance σ^2 will have an IID sample mean distribution that converges to a normal distribution for large sample size n :

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \frac{1}{n} \sum_{i=1}^n X_i \sim \mathcal{N}\left(\mu, \frac{\sigma^2}{n}\right)$$

Part b. What special properties of the normal distribution cause it to be the limiting distribution?

Problem 2

A particle is released at $(0, e) \in \mathbb{R}^2$ within the xy plane. The particle undergoes decoupled temporal motion (with respect to time t) given by the equations

$$dx = \mathcal{N}(0, 1)\sqrt{dt} \quad (\text{brownian motion})$$

$$dy = -y dt$$

until it reaches the line $y = 0.1$. At this moment, the particle begins to obey the equations of motion

$$dx = \sin(\alpha x) dt$$

$$dy = -y dt$$

for some $\alpha \in \mathbb{R}$.

Let $1 \gg \epsilon > 0$, and determine the probability, with respect to α , of the particle reaching a stable state $S \in \mathbb{R}^2$ where $\|S - (\pi, 0)\| < \epsilon$ for sufficiently large t . You may express your answer in terms of the standard normal cumulative distribution function Φ .

Problem 3

Suppose $\mu: \mathcal{B}(\mathbb{R}) \rightarrow \mathbb{Q} \cap [0, 1]$ is a rational-valued probability measure on the Borel σ -algebra \mathcal{B} over \mathbb{R} . Prove that μ takes finitely many values.
